#### **CLINICAL ACTIVITIES OR INNOVATIONS**

Recognized expertise in the management of Children with Special Health Care Needs and Child Abuse Pediatrics. I am one of two Board-Certified Child Abuse Pediatrician in a four-county region, and one of only 9 in Florida. There are approximately 350 Child Abuse Pediatricians in the United States. I was among the first two groups of pediatricians to be allowed to sit for the Child Abuse Board due to experience. (Current certification requires fellowship.) I have served as Medical Director for 7 programs (3 currently) and as a consultant for 4 programs. I direct one of the two complex care programs for children in the four-county region.
